# NRA files lawsuit challenging Colorado's excise tax on firearm and ammunition sales

FAIRFAX, VA - The National Rifle Association of America (NRA), together with the Firearms Policy Coalition, Second Amendment Foundation, Colorado State Shooting Association, Magnum Shooting Center, and an NRA member, filed a lawsuit challenging Colorado's 6.5% excise tax on the retail sale of firearms, firearm precursor parts, and ammunition.

Colorado's tax is set to take effect on April 1, 2025. The tax is levied on vendors, but the amount is passed through to lawabiding Coloradans every time they purchase such constitutionally protected items. The law also imposes burdensome registration and recordkeeping requirements on vendors and subjects them to harsh punishments for violations.

protect and defend the fundamental right to keep and bear

The United States Supreme Court recognized long ago that a right to tax is essentially a power to destroy. Thus, the Court has repeatedly held that the exercise of a constitutional right cannot be singled out for special taxation. But Colorado's law does precisely that, penalizing Coloradans for exercising their constitutional right to keep and bear arms through an infringementby-taxation scheme.

"Colorado's firearms excise tax is an overt assault on the Second Amendment rights of law-abiding Coloradans and a deliberate attempt to discourage the exercise of constitutionally protected freedoms," said John Commerford, Executive Director of the NRA Institute for Legislative Action (NRA-ILA).

The complaint argues that the tax violates the Second Amendment. The NRA seeks a declaratory judgment stating that the tax is unconstitutional and a permanent injunction forbidding its enforcement. The case, Langston v. Humphreys, was filed in the Denver County District Court.

# Battlefields saved through the Civil War sites preservation grant funds awarded

NASHVILLE – The Tennessee Wars Commission, the Tennessee Historical Commission division responsible for preserving the state's significant military history, has announced the Civil War Preservation Fund (CWSPF) grant recipients for Fiscal Year 2025. This fund, which was established in 2013, is provided by legislation to the Tennessee Historical Commission, who approves and awards CWSPF grants. The Tennessee Wars Commission administers the application and grant processes. With this round of grants the Civil War Sites Preservation Fund has now allocated \$20,312,188.32 in matching funds for the acquisition and 81.4 acres of battlefield lands: preservation of over 1,100 acres associated with the 38 most sig- •American Battlefield Trust, re- •Battle of Nashville Trust, Inc.,

Grants can also assist in funding the acquisition and protection of Underground Railroad sites eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places, or eligible for designation as a National Historic Landmark. "In addition to saving irreplaceable historic places, this valuable program has helped create parks and preserve open space and wildlife habitat, including in urban areas where there is significant development pressure," said Tennessee Historical Commission Director Patrick McIntyre. Grant funds totaling \$1,935,250.00 were awarded to six applicants during the 2025 fiscal year, saving approximately
