Wang earns Ben Hogan Award Golfer of the Month honor

FORT WORTH, Texas – University of Memphis men’s golf athlete Yixiang Wang has been named as a finalist for the Ben Hogan Award October Golfer of the Month honor, the foundation announced Thursday.

The Ben Hogan Award Golfer of the Month will be chosen by a selection committee comprised of foundation members from the Ben Hogan Award and Friends of Golf as well from as the award’s selected partners. In addition, a Fan Vote on social media through Thursday at 11 p.m. (CT) will give the top vote getter on each of the @benhoganaward social media channels (Facebook, Instagram and Twitter) a bonus committee vote. The winner will be announced on Thursday.

Wang is joined by Bryan Kim (Duke) and Nate Stevens (Notre

Dame) on the list. Wang, who has dominated the courses during the fall season, claimed the individual champion crown at the Steelwood Collegiate where he finished the tournament seven under par. The junior out of Dailan, China helped Memphis win the Quail Valley Collegiate as a team where he tied for career best three-round score (203). He also shot a career-low (63) in the

opening round of the tournament in route to a share of second place in individual play.

Wang also collected a top five finish at the Cullan Brown Invitational (T4th) after finishing four under par (138) in the shortened tournament.

The Ben Hogan Award presented by Baird annually recognizes the top collegiate golfer considering all college, amateur and professional events played over the 12-month period beginning with the 2025 NCAA Championships and running through the 2026 NCAA Regionals.

Sec. of War Pete Hegseth meets with U.S. Space Command Commander Gen. Stephen Whiting for briefing

Assistant to the Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs and Senior Advisor Sean Parnell provided the following readout: On November 20, Secretary of War Pete Hegseth met with General Stephen Whiting, commander of U.S. Space Command, at the Pentagon. The leaders discussed the relocation of U.S. Space Command's headquarters to Huntsville, Alabama. Gen. Whiting presented current relocation courses of action on efforts to relocate personnel and mission capabilities expeditiously and responsibly to sup-

port the President's directive. Both leaders discussed ways to accelerate the military construction process, additional requirements to cut through bureaucratic red tape, and the balance between cost, speed, and the uninterrupted execution of the command's war-fighting mission. Gen. Whiting reiterated the command's steadfast commitment to working with organizations across the Department of War and elected leaders to identify efficiencies in relocating the headquarters per the President's direction in an expedient manner while ensuring the U.S.

Space Command mission is unimpacted and can still achieve the requirements of our national security and allied and partner organizations. In September, President Donald Trump announced that U.S. Space Command – one of the Defense Department's 11 unified combatant commands – would be relocating from Peterson Space Force Base, Colorado, to the Army's Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Alabama. The command was reestablished in August 2019, during Trump's first term as president.

Memphis Safe Task Force Issues Guidance on How to Verify ‘Real Officers’

Real Officers Have Nothing To Hide. If In Doubt, Ask To Verify

Below is public guidance on how citizens can verify whether an individual is a legitimate law enforcement officer. This guidance reflects the ongoing commitment of the Memphis Safe Task Force and the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation (TBI) to ensure accountability and build safer communities through transparency and collaboration, particularly as plainclothes officers and unmarked vehicles are currently operating in Memphis.

Key Safety Tips for the Public

- **Proper Identification:** Real officers will identify themselves, state their agency, and explain the reason for the stop. They carry both a badge and agency-issued ID — always ask to see both. Officers should provide their badge number and agency name (Sheriff’s Office, Police Department, USMS, FBI, TBI, etc.). Be cautious if they refuse.
- **Uniforms & Equipment:** Radios, marked vehicles, and standard gear are common indicators. Even in plain clothes, officers must identify themselves once enforcement begins. If the officer is in an unmarked vehicle and you feel unsafe, request a marked unit to respond.
- **Verification Options:** If in doubt, call 911 or the agency’s non-emergency line to verify the officer’s identity and purpose. Legitimate officers will wait until credentials are confirmed.
- **Behavioral Cues:** Legitimate officers explain the reason for the stop and will never demand money, request wire transfers, or ask for personal financial information, passwords, or social media access.
- **Trust Your Instincts:** If something feels off, drive to a well-lit, public location such as a busy store parking lot before stopping.
- **Compliance in High-Risk Situations:** If you are unlawfully armed or sought for a violent offense, the safest and most responsible course of action is to comply with law enforcement commands and then seek these verification steps. Compliance protects lives and ensures the situation is resolved safely.

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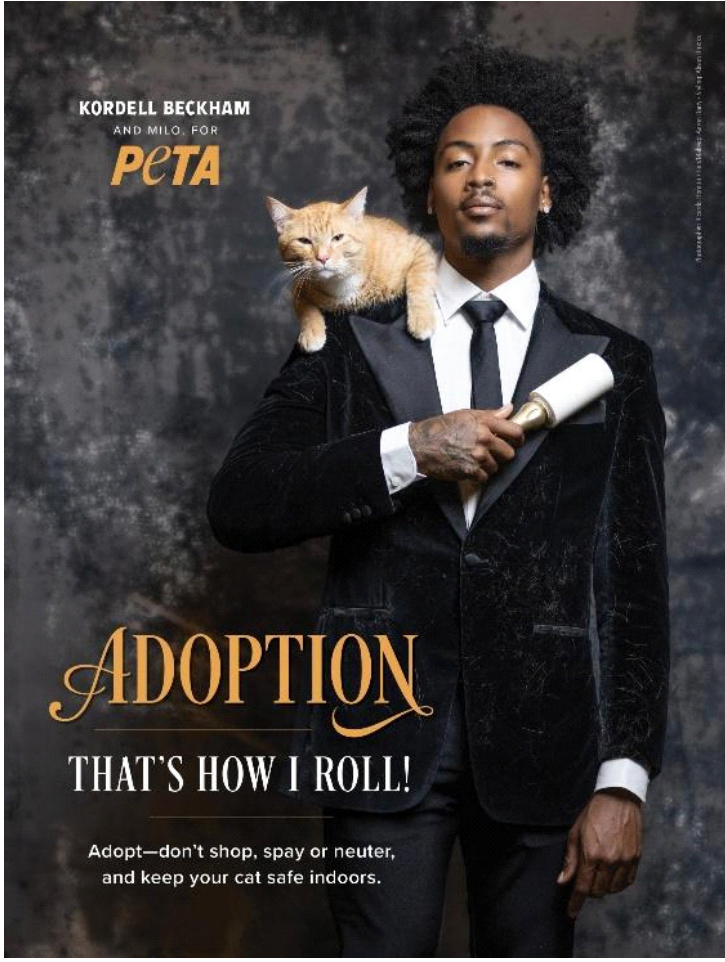
